LAS VEGAS, NEVADA, TUESDAY, AUGUST 30, 2011, 9:30 A.M.

(Court was called to order)

THE COURT: Is everyone here on Burke versus Hahn?

I would like to start with the motion for sanctions after everyone identifies themselves so the clerk can make good notes.

MS. TAYLOR: Good morning, Your Honor. Jennifer Taylor on behalf of plaintiffs.

MR. SEGEL: Nelson Segel on behalf of defendant Hahn and Hahn's World Surplus.

MR. CLARY: Your Honor, in lieu of making an appearance I'd like to make a brief statement to the Court, if I could so uninterrupted.

THE COURT: Certainly, Mr. Clary.

MR. CLARY: I -- this has been a very difficult case for me. I stand here as a defendant, as well as an attorney. I -- they say an attorney who has himself as his attorney has a fool for a client, and perhaps I'm a fool. No longer am I going to be a fool.

I -- I have never knew about the new developing specialty in the law called character assassination. And I'm a victim of it. So is a young man by the name of Jeremy, who's sitting right here. Ms. Taylor enjoys calling -- saying -- using the phrase over and over, enough is enough. For once I agree with her. Enough is enough.

I -- I cannot take it anymore. I am going to as of this moment resign and retire as a lawyer. I -- perhaps she can destroy my reputation, which she already has, but she cannot destroy my character. I will retain that. And I ask you to please release me and let me go home.

THE COURT: Mr. Clary, since you're a named defendant, are you going to have other counsel that represents you, or are you going to represent yourself in proper person?

MR. CLARY: I'm finished.

THE COURT: So I'm sorry to hear you're retiring.

You've been around for a long time. As long as I've been a lawyer you've been around.

MR. CLARY: Almost made it to 44 years, Your Honor, no thanks to Ms. Taylor.

THE COURT: Okay. Well, I have a pending motion that you filed that's on calendar today. Do you want me to hear that motion, or do you want me to vacate that motion?

MR. CLARY: Your Honor, I would love to have you grant my motion to dismiss me out as a defendant. But dismissing me out as a defendant will not change the fact that Ms. Taylor has destroyed my reputation. I cannot -- I built a reputation as a securities lawyer for 40 years, and I can no longer hold my head up high and say to a client that I can represent you without disclosing to them that I've been accused of committing securities fraud. I can't function.

And so I don't know what you want to do. I will sit here, if you insist I do so; but I cannot any longer go forward with this case in good conscience. Mr. Hahn is a person that I've known for many years. He, like me, is a graduate of Las Vegas High School. I'm ashamed to say this in front of an old friend of mine sitting in the back, Dennis Haney went to high school with me, to make this announcement today in front of him. I'm more ashamed to admit that I'm still a lawyer in front of a young man like Jeremy, whose character was attacked because he had the audacity to come forward and sign an affidavit. And Ms. Taylor went to the Internet and is now is attacking his credibility based upon inadmissible evidence that she published to Your Honor.

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I am -- I don't want to reach the level of being a practitioner of this profession and a participant in this judicial system where I am ashamed of being such. And I'm almost at that point, and my resignation is done shamelessly, but it's done with sincerity, with irrevocability, and with finality. So I can go home to my wife and my family and be proud of myself and not have to put up with what I've been subjected to in this case. And I can no longer say that I can be proud to be a member of a legal system, the legal profession, and a judicial system that would countenance specializing in character assassination as a new form of practice of law.

THE COURT: All right, Mr. Clary --

MR. CLARY: I can't do it, and I've had it. If I look defeated, I'm not. There's other things in my life I can do.

THE COURT: Okay. Well, Mr. Clary, I'll certainly let you go home, if that's what you want to do. I need to ask Mr. Hahn a couple of questions, though, because you were representing Kokoweef, Mr. Clary. And so Mr. Hahn, who's involved in Kokoweef, now needs to make a decision as to whether Kokoweef is going to have other counsel, because it can't represent itself, or whether you're going to ask Mr. Segel to represent you.

So I'm going to let you guys take a break and go out in the hallway and caucus.

Yes, Mr. Segel.

MR. SEGEL: I'll be glad to go caucus, Your Honor, but Mr. Clary -- I am in this case representing Mr. Hahn because I cannot -- Mr. Clary couldn't represent Mr. Hahn and Kokoweef, and I cannot represent both, either. So we will have to have new counsel for Kokoweef.

THE COURT: So then I can't have hearings today.

Because every hearing I have involves Kokoweef to one extent or another.

MR. SEGEL: Your Honor, I'll represent to this Court, because I'm sure Ms. Taylor's going to jump up and

down, this is new to me. Mr. Clary told me this morning walking in here. I don't know anything about it.

THE COURT: Mr. Segel, I'm not questioning that.

All right. So how long do you need? Because I assume Mr. Hahn's going to be the one who's got the laboring oar of finding a new lawyer for Kokoweef.

MR. SEGEL: Your Honor, I -- I guess I will have to work with Mr. Hahn as the president of Kokoweef to find new counsel. Hopefully that doesn't mean I'm representing Kokoweef, as I'm being argued throughout this case. But I need a minimum of two weeks to find somebody, and then we've got to find out if we can get them to come in. The issue, obviously, Your Honor -- I hate -- I want to go to trial in a month. I'm not sure how that happens now when we -- Kokoweef -- you know, we've got to deal with the summary judgment motions. And if the Court denies the summary judgment motions, we have one situation. If the Court grants it, we have a different situation.

And then I also have this issue of pleading, Your Honor. And this -- I would like the Court to order there will be no more pleading in this case, because we pointed to all the problems the plaintiffs had with failing to provide any competent evidence.

THE COURT: Okay. Let's stop for a minute. How long do you need to determine -- and I guess I need to ask Mr.

Hahn.

How long do you need to determine if you're going to be able to find new counsel? You've got -- technically you have a calendar call on Thursday. I'm not going to make you go to trial with this particular situation that's occurred, but I am going to keep pressure on you so that we get back on the trial stack as soon as possible. So if I give you two weeks, do you think that's enough time, sir, for you to find a new lawyer given what Mr. Clary said to us today?

MR. HAHN: Yes.

THE COURT: All right. I'm going to set a status check on new counsel for Kokoweef in two weeks. We're not going to argue any of the motions in two weeks, because I didn't think it would be fair to new counsel to put them in that position. If new counsel has already substituted in and you can agree to a schedule for the hearing of the motions, then you guys can just tell me that, and I won't have to worry about having you come in in two weeks. Otherwise, I'll see you and we'll figure out what we're doing. Is that okay?

All right. Goodbye.

MS. TAYLOR: Do we have any date now?

THE COURT: Goodbye.

MS. TAYLOR: Okay.

THE CLERK: September 13, 9:00 a.m.

MS. TAYLOR: That's all I wanted, Your Honor.
